

Each year, a significant number of our students complete a course at Hurricane Island Outward Bound School only because a generous donor like you provided the funding needed to cover the cost of their tuition in the form of a scholarship award. 2015 has been no different and I am thrilled to show you this Impact Report that highlights all the great work you are doing with us.

This year, 300 of our graduates began their Outward Bound journey only because of you. 



The Hurricane Island Outward Bound School Scholarship Program is guided by a single principle: **every person, regardless of means, should have the opportunity to discover more about themselves, through the adventure and challenge of an Outward Bound course.**

The Scholarship Program consists of six major award categories:

LEADERSHIP AWARDS | 24 STUDENTS

The Leadership Award program consists of merit-based scholarships at select schools and youth-serving organizations. These awards were created to provide young men and women with demonstrated leadership potential the opportunity to attend a 14- or 22-day course in the summer after their sophomore or junior year of high school. Each participating organization determines the criteria by which they select their Award recipient.

EMERGING LEADER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS | 12 STUDENTS

Emerging Leader Memorial Scholarships are annual awards with a variety of criteria from which students are selected. Memorial scholarships are created in memory of a loved one who had a life-changing experience with Outward Bound.

DISCOVERY AWARDS PROGRAM | 31 STUDENTS

Discovery Awards are merit- and need-based awards that provide partial-tuition scholarships for students on our Classic and Intercept courses. Discovery Awards are based on financial need, student motivation and the individual's potential to excel on a wilderness expedition.

PINNACLE SCHOLARS PROGRAM | 64 STUDENTS

The Pinnacle Scholars program provides the opportunity for high-achieving students, many from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, to attend an Outward Bound course free of charge to the student. This program represents a partnership between HIOBS and youth-serving and college-prep organizations across the country.

OUTWARD BOUND FOR VETERANS | 108 STUDENTS

The Outward Bound for Veterans program provides fully-funded, week-long courses for returning service members and veterans of the U.S. military. These courses have been made possible by generous contributions from a network of private donors and charitable foundations that contribute either directly to HIOBS or through Outward Bound, Inc.

CUSTOM GROUP PROGRAMS | 46 STUDENTS

In addition to the scholarships awarded to students attending our classic expedition courses, scholarship donations to HIOBS in 2015 were also used to support our North Country School program, the Collier County Spring Break Leadership course, and the Martin County Boys & Girls Club program.






